Legislative Update- January 2023

General Comments: As we are in the "winter doldrums", so to speak, in regards to our legislative activity, I have been reflecting on possible new directions in regards to these articles. However, I urge everyone to get involved in our advocacy effort with our legislators as well as with MOAA and CALMOAA. Pass any information on to all either through the MOAA Voice or by email - just get the word out!

Based on conversations with some of our members, I have a gut feeling that more information should be provided either through information passed on in the articles, or by references to other websites for more detailed and more current information is available. Examples of these besides the MOAA magazine, include the CALVET website, CALMOAA website, and others.

MOAA.ORG website is an excellent starting point.

Though much information is available, it is almost essential to be either a **Prime** or a **Life Member** to have access to everything on the MOAA website. There is wealth of information available with only a push of the finger.

- The News Letter keeps you up to date on as weekly basis if desired. Find this under the News and Info tab where you will be shown how to subscribe to this. I recommend a weekly letter due to this fast moving environment.
- Publications & Reports shows an extensive list of current publications available to Prime and Life Members. Take a look at the list.
- **Webinars** are listed under the Events tab and also provide the most current topics in the form of video conferences. Well worth the time.
- Surviving Spouses Corner (sscomm@moaa.org) is a very important tab for those survivors and those who should be prepared for such a situation. Surviving Spouses formally were "Auxiliary Members". MOAA's Surviving Spouses Corner and CALMOAA's Surviving Spouses Chair Kathy Prout. These are very dynamic spouses who advocate and "push out the word" to all. I suggest getting involved through MOAA's Facebook page. Also, Chapter President Johnson will work to set up a meeting with Kathy for our members sometime during the coming year if possible.
- Legislative Advocacy provides an easy way to make your wishes known to your Congressperson or Senator . Just open the advocacy tab and it will guide you through the process which should not take more than a minute or two. Remember, our Legislators will only be inspired if you - their constituents - hear from you.

VA.GOV website is possibly the next best site for information. There is an abundance of information on this website for all including survivors.

WWW.CALVET.CA.GOV will give updates on the latest in this state. Unfortunately, there is no "one stop" solution for the many questions.

State:

Our legislative thrust in the next year will in the following topics.

Exemption of Military Retirement from State Income Tax. Work is in process to represent this subject in a bit of different form so we don't muddy the water.

More Property Tax Relief for Disabled Vets. Updates to current legislation needs to be made to correct for inflation.

Transfer of Teaching Credentials from other States. This is needed to meet current teaching needs in California.

Addendum to January 2023 Voice Latest Legislative Update

Information just came in and needs your immediate attention!

CALMOAA 3rd VP for Legislative Affairs, Jeff Breiton, forwarded a letter he sent to Governor Gavin Newsom via email to: which I send to for your information and future action. We will be using this as a template to be presented to our Assemblymen and State Senators. Please stay alert - once more, this will be an all hand effort.

"Governor Newsom;

"Assembly member James Ramos has introduced AB 46, "Exemption of Military Retirement form State Income Taxes". We truly appreciate Assembly member Ramos for recognizing the significant contributions our military retirees and their spouses provide to California's work force development and the \$168 billion dollars the Defense Industry brings to California each year. Governor Newsom, it is time that California joins the other 49 states that currently provide an exemption on military retirement from state income taxes and support AB 46.

"Department of Defense Actuary Reports show that California had 165,502 retirees in 2010, and that number was reduced to 149,430 in 2020. That same DOD Actuary Report reveals a continued decline in California's military retiree population, which as of 2021 has shrunk to 128,561. The decline in California's military retiree population has a negative impact on federal funds that flow into California. Those federal funds follow the military retirees to the state they retire in. Both AZ and NV have seen an increase in their state's military retiree population during this same period.

"A 2021 study, conducted by the California Research Bureau, California State Library on "National Economic Impact Studies states; California is home to the nation's largest concentration of military personnel and other national security activity. The study states that in 2020 military and national security activities generated an estimated \$168.7 billon in economic activity, approximately 5.4% of California's economy.

"Military retirees, with an average age of 42, who have spent the last 20 years serving our country as Medical Professionals, in field of National Security, as Engineers, Aviation Maintenance, Engineers, Space Force and Vocational Trades provide the state with a valuable work force. Many military retirees already have security clearances, and are ready from the first day of retirement to enter national security professions that California, currently has a shortage of. Studies conducted by the San Diego Military Council clearly show that these 2nd careers generate millions of dollars of additional revenue for local communities, counties and California from local taxes, sales taxes and state taxes on the salaries of those 2nd careers.

"Keep military retirees and their valuable skill set in California and support AB 46.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS

The application period for COL William G. Brey Scholarships will open on January 1, 2023, and will close on March 15, 2023. Closing date is firm. Those eligible to apply for scholarship assistance are children, wards, and lineal descendants (including grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and great-great-grandchildren, natural or adopted) of living or deceased officer, warrant officer, or auxiliary members of the Chapter. Scholarship eligibility is limited to those pursuing undergraduate academic and professional certificate programs. Applications will not be accepted for support of graduate studies.

Our experience is that it can take some time for prospective applicants to gather all the required supporting documentation, then prepare and submit the completed application before the cutoff date. We therefore recommend that Chapter members advise eligible family members of scholarship availability and contact information early enough to give them sufficient reaction time.
